Sound Processor Retention Options

With Winter on its way, some of you may be worried about the security of your sound processor whilst wearing hats or hoods to protect from wet and windy weather. There are various options available to keep your processor secure and reduce the risk of loss or damage to your device. Check out the following sound processor retention options:

Behind The Ear Processor Retention





Cochlear Snugfit & Hugfit and Medel Huggy

An alternative to the standard ear hook provided with your behind the ear processor. These accessories can provide a better fit, allowing your processor to "hug" the ear and reduce the risk of it being knocked or falling off your ear. Compatible with Nucleus 7 & 8 and Sonnet 1 & 2.



Cochlear Safety Cord

The safety cord provides additional security by allowing Nucleus 7 & 8 recipients to clip their sound processor to clothing and can reduce the risk of loss.



Earmould

An earmould can be attached to any behind the ear sound processor in the same way an earmould would connect to a hearing aid. A custom fit earmould can provide an anchor point and thus provide a more secure fitting for your processor.

Off The Ear Processor Retention



Cochlear Safety Line & Medel Attachment Clip

Both Cochlear and Medel offer hair and clothes clips for their off the ear sound processor. Clipping your Kanso or Rondo to your hair or clothes can reduce the risk of loss or damage to your off the ear sound processor.



Cochlear Headband & Medel Sports Headband

The Medel and Cochlear off the ear headbands are designed to keep your processor securely in place during exercise. Simply fit your Kanso or Rondo processors into the pocket of the headband.

Please check your upgrade or switch on kit before contacting the department regarding retention options. Most retention options are provided as standard, however should you need support or a different size, please contact the department for further information.

Cochlear Remote Care: The Next Steps and Inspire Study

Those of you who use a smart-phone may already be familiar with Cochlear's Remote Check option, which allows some testing of your implant and device performance from home, via the Nucleus Smart App. Or, you may have tried out a video-call appointment using 'Attend Anywhere' on your phone or computer. Now the next stage of remote care has arrived: Cochlear Remote Assist!



This new feature combines Remote Check with the ability to make some limited programming changes and an embedded video call/chat platform so you can chat with us while we try to sort out any problems you are having – all from the comfort of home! If you have a Cochlear device and a smartphone, and wish to try this feature, please discuss with your audiologist at your next appointment – face to face appointments will of course remain available.

To explore how well remote care works in real life, we are very excited to have signed up as a study site for the **INSPIRE** international randomised controlled study. We hope to recruit 12 new CI users over the next year or so, who will be split randomly into two 'arms'. One arm will receive normal 'in-clinic' care from 3-12 months after their switchon. The other arm will have any appointments from 3-12 months remotely (where possible), only coming into clinic if there is a problem that cannot be properly dealt with remotely. For both arms there will be a number of additional questionnaires to complete to see how well this works for recipients, including outcomes, any benefits (e.g. time and money saved) and any disadvantages. If you are less than three months since switch-on and are interested in getting involved, please contact us as soon as possible so we can share further details!

In other news: for our Advanced Bionics recipients, Marvel remote care is also on the way soon. Medel recipients please watch this space – this is a fast moving scene, and it's likely something similar will also be in development for you
